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# 1 SCHOOL VISION AND MISSION

#### 1.1 Vision

HKSC was founded in 2006 and is the first and unique Direct Subsidy Scheme (DSS) senior secondary school in Hong Kong devoted to actualizing arts and creative education. It envisages the development of a civil society through nurturing the creativity and individual potential of the young generation. As a learning community led by dreams and vision, HKSC also provides a platform and a think-tank to facilitate exchange, research and development of quality creative education at local, regional and international levels.

#### 1.2 Mission

HKSC provides young people with an all-round creative learning experiences and opportunities for self-fulfillment,

- with minimum pressure of examinations and greater flexibility for effective learning;
- through a unique inter-disciplinary curriculum responding to the development of a civil society and a knowledge-based economy;
- by fostering positive values, cultural literacy, competency in communication, as well as creative and critical thinking;
- as a cross-cultural hub for the sustainable development of creative education.

# 2 THE SCHOOL MANAGEMENT COMMITTEE

- 2.1 There are 11 members on the School Management Committee, chaired by the School Supervisor, Ms Ada Wong, JP. The other committee members are: Dr Raymond Chan, DBA, Ms Sylvia Chang, Dr Cheung Kwok Wah, Mr Ip Kin Yuen (Principal), Mr Freeman Lau, Mr Martin Ka Shing Lee, Ms Vanessa Pong, Mr Man Yee Wan, JP, Mr Mathias Woo and Mr Danny Yung.
- **2.2** Dr Cheung Kwok Wah resigned from the SMC on Feb 1, 2009 due to his new position in the EDB.

#### 3 STUDENTS

#### 3.1 Class Organization

In September 2008, there were 18 classes with 195 boys and 270 girls, making a total of 465 students, representing a growth of 26.4%. The growth

was mainly due to the operation of the 1st cohort of S.6 students.

#### **3.2** Sources of S.4 students

There are 2 major sources of students:

- the majority of students (68.5%) entered HKSC by free enrolment and selection (including 2.6% repeaters);
- a significant portion (31.5%) was sent to the school by the Junior Secondary Education Allocation (JSEA) exercise by the Education Bureau; and

Comparatively, students allocated through JSEA tend to drop out of study more often than those by application.

#### **3.3** Sources of S.6 students

- 36.8% are internally promoted from S.5; and
- 63.2% are externally recruited.
- 60.0% of those externally recruited are recruited through the *conditional offer* system.

# 4 STAFF

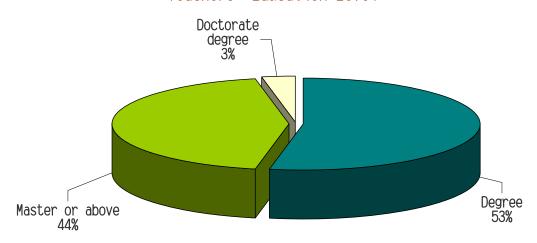
# **4.1** Full-Time Teaching Staff

There are 39 full-time teaching staff members in our school: the Principal, 1 Creative Education Director, 1 Art and Culture Manager, 2 Acting Assistant Principals, 1 Academic Administrator, 32 full-time teachers, 1 full-time Resource Centre Manager and 1 part-time Resource Centre Assistant.

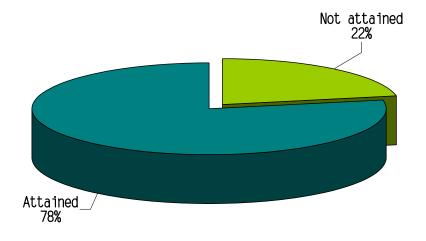
#### (a) Teachers' Qualification

All teachers have attained first degrees, among those, 44% have obtained their master degrees. 78% have completed their professional teacher training, while the rest are working towards achieving the requisite qualification shortly. The graphic representation is as follows:

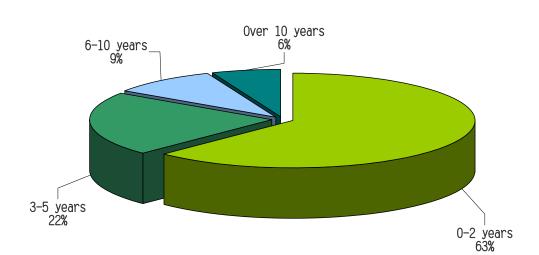
Teachers' Education Level

# (b) Teaching Experience Teachers in HKSC are comparatively young and energetic. A small portion of teachers (6%) have taught for over 10 years, while the majorities (63%) have not taught for more than 2 years.

#### **4.2** Creative Education Office and Part-Time CPOP Tutors

There are 7 full-time staff in the Creative Education Office, namely,

- Creative Education Director
- Arts and Culture Manager
- Resource Centre Manager (with 1 Assistant)
- Assistant Creative Education Manager (to run a class for students with special learning aptitudes by adopting art-in-education)
- CPOP Coordinator
- Technical Arts Manager (with 1 Assistant)
- IT Coordinator (with 1 *IT-seeds*)

There are around 22 part-time CPOP Tutors who are mainly artists, architects and experts in cultural studies.

#### **4.3** Staff Development

- Teachers are encouraged to do mutual class observation and share their teaching experience.
- Teacher development days and orientation programmes for fresh teachers are held. External guest speakers such as Mr Joseph Lian, other artists and experts have been invited to share their insight and valuable experience with our teachers.
- More often, informal sharing among teachers is held from time to time.
- Teachers are also encouraged to pursue for further development, including art performance and publications.

# 5 CURRICULUM, LEARNING AND TEACHING

- **5.1** Two ideas have been coined in describing the teaching and learning in HKSC.
- **5.2** Firstly, *Art-in-Education* (AiE) serves as the general design principle of the curriculum in HKSC. Artistic creations and elements are used in lessons to reinforce learning objectives and to motivate students.
- 5.3 Apart from the day-to-day teaching in classes, the school-based Creative Professional-oriented Programmes (CPOP), including Multimedia Performance Arts, Design and Visual Communication, Film and Digital Arts, and Environmental and Spatial Studies, are mandatory curricula throughout the study of S.4 and the 1st semester of S.5. For S.6 students, they are required to take one of the four programmes throughout the S.6 year of study. Students obviously enjoy the study of CPOP and have progressively improved from one semester to another. These programmes are not subject to any public examination.
- 5.4 Second, the philosophy of *liberal arts education* (LAE) is to achieve the goal of education through helping students to understand themselves, the society and the world. Students should also develop a humanistic vision, a broad global sense and the ability to research, analyze and be critical. Apart from the day-to-day teaching in classes, mass lectures are also given by various outstanding artists and socio-cultural figures to broaden the knowledge of students. Details can be found in Part 10 (Major Events) of this document.

# 8 MAJOR CONCERNS

- **8.1** This section provides a brief review of our progress regarding the items listed in the School Development Plan for 2008/09.
- 8.2 Teacher Professional Development
  - *Orientation for New Teachers:*

Professional development sessions were held for both serving and new teachers to orientate the teaching staff with the school vision and mission, and school ethos, etc. The sessions were in general considered to be successful but inadequate.

• *Professional Development Activities*:

Professional development activities were held more frequently than the previous year particularly approaching the end of the year for the school re-focus.

- 8.3 Development of Liberal-Arts Education and Arts-in-Education
  - *Innovation Within Subjects*:

Regular teachers were encouraged to innovate within their subjects. For example, the English team launched a special room to nurture an environment for learning English. The PE subject started the rope dancing. These made learning more relevant to students' day-to-day life.

• *Collaboration with Higher Education Institutions:* 

We continue to work with higher education institutions such as the Lingnan University on projects on subjects like Liberal Studies.

#### • *Cultural Day:*

Cultural days were held after each of the semesters. All students participated in small groups led by teachers to visit various art and cultural spots in Hong Kong and beyond. All of them were well received.

#### • *Project Weeks*:

All students were required to do a creative works on individual basis after each school semester. During the Project weeks, regular classes were suspended so that they could focus on their creation. Individual guidance was given by CPOP tutors and regular teachers and sometimes guest critics. Feedbacks were also provided for further improvement. Throughout the year, students' works improved significantly from one semester to another.

#### • *Artists In-Residence and International Collaboration*:

Two English visual artists and a local fashion designer were invited to be artists in-residence. Each led a group of students and worked towards exhibition and shows. They were very successful.

The Signing of Memorandum of Understanding between Haja Production School (Korea) and HKSC also led to more collaboration between the two institutions. Students of both places had the opportunities to visit each other and learned from different cultures.

#### **8.4** Promoting Self-Management of Students

# • *General Meeting of Students:*

General meetings were held for open discussions over important issues from time to time. For example, a forum was held to discuss the issue of arts expression and sex. Students were encouraged to voice their own opinions publicly.

#### • Participation:

Students participated in various school activities including new student recruitment interviews, and the organizing of Open Day, etc. We also encouraged students to take initiatives to organize activities of their own, such as the street performances for student recruitment.
